




# Message from the Pastor

SACRAMENTALS AND SACRAMENTS: I would like to take some time to reflect on each of the sacraments in this column, but first I want to talk about SACRAMENTALS which will lead us into talking about sacraments. The distinction I will try to be making is that sacramentals can be things that lead us to think about God or be signs and symbols that invite us to reflect on what is precious or meaningful in our lives, but they are not sacraments. Sacraments, the seven sacraments of our church, are not mere signs and symbols, but they are real experiences of God's presence. The signs and symbols we use can help us to experience this real presence of God.

At times people will pull out old family picture albums and look at pictures of family members and family events. In the discussion about those pictures and events, it can seem like those people are here again or that the events are being re-lived.

Or maybe you come across a souvenir from a vacation you took long ago. As you hold that souvenir you think about the good times you had on that vacation. The memories all come back to you.

Many people have photos in frames on the wall or on the mantle of those who have died or who live in other places. When we look at those photos, we are reminded of how important those people were to us or are to us.

These ordinary incidents from everyday life are signs or symbols of things or people we consider important, maybe even sacred. We might call them SACRAMENTAL because they are signs of something dear to us or sacred. What is sacred to us, doesn't have to be something connected to God or religion, but it may be something that is precious or important to us.

We might think of dishes our mother gave to us, or tools our father gave us, old furniture, or things that we have passed down from generation to generation. These are things that are important or precious to us. They bring feelings and memories to life within us that are dear to us.

Some people might look at a moonlit or starlit night sky and think there has to be someone who made all this. Standing at the edge of the ocean and watching the sunrise or sunset can lead us to the same wonder at the world we live in and how it all began. Or we might take a walk through the woods and feel at one with the beauty of life that surrounds us. These moments are precious, sacred, and important to us. These may be ways we experience how nature can be SACRAMENTAL. These can be moments when we feel God's presence. St. Augustine viewed the whole world and all the wonderful things in it as SACRAMENTAL, revealing the grandeur and majesty of God.

Think about a time when you entered a beautiful church and suddenly felt God was there. Or maybe you have made a pilgrimage to Lourdes, Fatima, Assisi, or some other holy shrine and felt God's presence there. Or maybe you have made a retreat, a Cursillo, or some other spiritual event where you had a heightened experience of God's love and presence. These are also SACRAMENTAL moments.

In these SACRAMENTAL moments we might notice two things happening: one is that there is something you experience with your hands or see with your eyes. And the other things you experience is this sense that there is something more that you perceive in your minds eye or sense in your heart or soul. This something more may be something that is precious to you, and it may even be an experience of God's presence or love. In effect, we look through the visible sign or symbol to see in faith that there is something more here than meets the eye.

We may experience this as we pray before the tabernacle, or before a statue of our favorite saint. It may be when we bless ourselves with holy water or when we receive ashes on our forehead on Ash Wednesday. It may be when we hear the Scriptures read at Mass or when we are saying the Stations of the Cross. These moments are times when we experience a physical thing that somehow speaks to our heart. All of these things are NOT sacraments, but SACRAMENTALS. These experiences put us in touch with some aspect of our faith in God.

(Next week, I will look at how we move from Jesus to the Sacraments.)

# **Cemetery Gravestone Cleaning Project**

We are offering gravestone cleaning on a limited scale at ST. THOMAS & ST. ELIZABETH CEMETERIES ONLY. Some members of our cemetery committees are trained in gravestone cleaning/preservation. The process will



help remove dirt, lichen, and lighten up some discolorations/stains on gravestones. It is safe and gentle, so it will not damage the stones. Because each stone is unique, pricing may vary. Rate base estimates are: Small stone (24"-35")—\$50; Medium (36"-59")—\$100; and Large (60"-75")—\$150. If you wish to have a loved one's stone cleaned, please contact the parish office. We will be taking orders for those who are interested. Thank you.

# <u>Liturgical Overview for the 30<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time</u>

As the year moves towards its close, the Church presents us with another of those poignant readings from Saint Paul, this time from the second Letter to Timothy. In it we have the statement of the Apostle at the end of his life, looking forward to what is to come with absolute faith, and looking back at his life with absolute contentment - not because it was easy, but because it was meaningful, it was fulfilling, it was a challenge worthy of a lifetime.

At the end of our days, and at the end of the liturgical year, it is important to see our own lives in this context. Are we pouring our days out in honor of God? Do we act with justice and humility in our relationships with other people? Are we stewards of creation, using the gifts of the earth wisely? # "Question of the Week" - 30<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time

Thanksgiving. Parishioners are asked to please donate non-perishable food items. Place donations in the marked bins at the entrances of St. Thomas Church.






