Notes from the Pastor

FISH DINNERS: We are gearing up for Fish Dinners at both Churches and that means we could always use your help.

• Desserts: A huge part of the success of our dinners is that people get homemade desserts. We are asking the great bakers in our Churches to start thinking about and getting ready for making desserts for this year's Fish Dinners. At <u>St. Teresa</u> desserts can be dropped off on Thursday from 4 to 7pm, or Friday anytime after Noon. At <u>St. Thomas</u> desserts can be dropped off Thursday from 12 to 3pm or Friday anytime after Noon.

• We are always in need of help serving dinners each night. This is a great way for young people to be involved, but is not limited to them, anyone can help.

• Posters for the Dinners are in the back of Church at St. Teresa. If you can help by placing a poster at your place of business or some other spot, please take one or more.

<u>UPCOMING EVENTS</u>: As Lent is rapidly approaching, here are some dates to keep in mind.

• Ash Wednesday is March 5. We will have Masses at St. Thomas at 8:00am and at St. Teresa at 7:00pm with ashes being distributed. There will also be a Liturgy of the Word service with the distribution of ashes at BOTH churches at Noon.

• **Stations of the Cross** will be prayed on Thursdays of Lent at St. Teresa at 7:00pm and on Fridays of Lent at St. Thomas at 7:30pm.

• **Penance Service** will be at St. Thomas on Sunday, March 23, at 1:30pm. There will be several priests there to hear confessions as a part of the service.

<u>CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING</u>: I have reflected so far on the ideas that as people made in the image and likeness of God, we are called to not only pursue our happiness on our own, but in relationship with one another. This gives us the basis of our Catholic Social teaching. We will look next at how this calls us to work for justice.

So, what is justice? Children from a very early age have a keen notion of what is fair and what is unfair. Justice may be defined as making sure everyone gets what is fair or giving others their due. We might simply look at the fact that 700,000 children are victims of abuse or neglect every year in the United States. Or we might see that 15% of US citizens live below the poverty level. We then would conclude that these are not fair. These are not just. And somehow, we have a responsibility to address these injustices. We might call that our responsibility to work for Social Justice, to work for the justice and fairness that affects all people.

This notion of Social Justice includes three different types of justice: commutative, distributive, and legal.

Commutative Justice is what we owe each other individually. This might include paying back our debts, or what we have borrowed; repairing the damage we have done to someone else's property;

employees putting in a full day's work; and employers paying them a fair wage for their work. There are responsibilities we have to each other as family, friends, neighbors, and places where we work.

Distributive Justice is what society owes us. Our society provides many services to us: police and firefighters, roads repair and snow removal, protection through the armed services, public education, public transportation and housing. Often these services are paid for by the taxes we pay.

Legal Justice is what we owe society. This would include paying taxes, serving on a jury, or whatever legal documents and laws require of us.

Social Justice then is how we make sure that everyone is getting their due and doing their fair share. This has been part of the mission of the Church since the very beginning. It was formally addressed in 1891 by Pope Leo XIII in the first social encyclical, Rerum Novarum (On the Condition of Labor). Social Justice applies the message of Jesus Christ to the structures, systems, and laws of society in order to guarantee the rights of individuals.

Social Justice is the type of justice that ensures the practice of the other types of justice described above. It is when people work together and with organizations to identify the needs of society, and by the use of appropriate means, to meet these needs locally, regionally, nationally, and even globally.

Is Ash Wednesday a holy day of obligation?

Despite the often packed churches, you may be surprised to hear that the answer is no! Holy days of obligation commemorate a particular event (such as the birth of Christ at Christmas) or celebrate particular people (such as Mary's Immaculate Conception or the feast of All Saints). Ash Wednesday is a day of penance, fasting, and abstinence to begin the season of Lent. In a sense, it focuses on a *concept* rather than something particular and concrete.

Of course, repentance ought to be reflected in particular, concrete ways! That's one of the reasons that attending Mass on Ash Wednesday is a very good idea. It marks the beginning of a solemn season of penance. Despite all its comparisons to the desert, Lent can be very fruitful for our spiritual growth! 

POLITICAL ISSUES TO KEEP IN MIND IN THE COMING MONTH

As a Church and a non-profit organization, we are not permitted to endorse a political party or candidate. That includes those who would use our facilities for a gathering or an event. We encourage people to register to vote and to exercise their right to vote. We can host voter registration events but only if both parties are represented and able to register. We can even hold polling places in our buildings. Political signs are not permitted on Church property as they constitute us supporting one candidate over another, even if that candidate is a parishioner.

Some examples of what can and cannot be done: It is not permissible to rent out a Catholic facility for a dinner for a political party or a candidate for office. Likewise, while it would be permissible to conduct a general voter-registration drive, it would not be permissible to conduct a Democratic or Republican voter-registration drive, since by their nature these would be partisan events.

The Church can host events that explain the Catholic position on issues according to the Catholic moral tradition and social teaching.

NO GROUP or ORGANIZATION has permission to distribute flyers or other voter education information on Church property. Church parking lots are private property and therefore it is inappropriate for groups or individuals to "leaflet" or distribute materials on cars parked in church parking lots. No one has permission to "leaflet" or distribute materials on cars parked in church parking lots.

The Church must walk a fine line between encouraging people to vote and be educated on issues but can never endorse a particular party or candidate. If a Church crosses this line, it could lose its tax exempt – nonprofit status.

We ask that there be $\underline{\text{no solicitation}}$ at the Fish Dinners or at Masses for political candidates.

Our Religious Education Program combined this year. Now that we are in the second half of the Religious Education year (January—May) — ALL








Eucharistic *Eucharistic Adoration THIS WEEK*
